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INTRODUCTION

The English department is one of the most vibrant departments of the college with great popularity among the students. It combines both conventional learning and innovative teaching and learning strategies. Apart from the conventional classroom, the department offers the use of a state-of-the-art language laboratory to facilitate fluency and linguistic skills. Continuous internal assessment in the form of class tests, quizzes, spelling bee contests etc. also enhances the learning experience of the students.

Literature written in English has a long and rich history. From the Anglo-Saxon bards of over a thousand years ago up to contemporary writers from all over the world, **studying literature enables the learners to understand how language and representation shape history, identity and experience**. Students in English classes study and discuss texts of all kinds, including poems, plays, novels and essays.

Along with enlarging their cultural horizons, students of English gain a rigorous training in the skills of critical thinking - reading and interpreting texts, analyzing complex data, making judgments, marshalling evidence and presenting arguments of their own. These are all skills employers and professional schools desire from new graduates. They come to recognize how language can be used to influence readers and how it has shaped their own perceptions, beliefs and values. The critical skills developed in sensitive and imaginative reading carries over to their own writing. Well-written literature demonstrates how to use words precisely and suggestively, how to express thoughts and feelings, how to persuade and move others. Students who undertake the study of English are simultaneously learning how to think clearly and critically and how to write effectively with polish, precision and force.

In terms of **career opportunities**, many exciting job prospects are open to students of English literature like **teaching**, **research**, **journalism**, **advertising**, **corporate communication**, **technical writing**, **content writing**, **publishing** and so on, thus making it a worthwhile and rewarding course to pursue.

HISTORY OF THE DEPARTMENT

The department of English of the college was affiliated with the University of Calcutta on 29 September 1969 and English was offered as a General subject from the 1969-70 academic session. The department began to offer the Honours course in English from the academic session 2002-03. From 2018 onwards, with the introduction of the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), the annual examination system was replaced by the semester system. From the 2023-24 academic session, the college, in adherence to the university norms, adopted the Curriculum and Credit Framework (CCF) as per the New Education Policy (NEP).

From the outset, the English department immensely benefited from two outstanding academicians, who shaped and nurtured the department with devotion and intellect. Professor Ajoy Kumar Paul and Professor Nirmal Banerjee were both committed teachers and enriched the department with their toil and dedication. They instilled a love of learning for the subject and were well loved by generations of students. Prof. Paul was an authority in Victorian Literature and known far and wide for his expertise in Rhetoric and Prosody. Prof. Banerjee was a distinguished academician and was an honourable member of the Board of Studies of Calcutta University. But by 2004, both of them had retired in quick succession leaving the Honours course in a fledgling state. It was in 2007 that the current full time faculty members were appointed.

Presently, the department consists of two substantive teachers (Anupama Maitra, Associate Professor and Head of the Department, and Piyali Das, Associate Professor) and three State Aided College Teachers (SACT – Debajyoti Das, Moumita Purkait and Sruba Jana).

PROGRAMS OFFERED

- The department of English offers an undergraduate **English Major and Minor courses** following the **CCF (Curriculum and Credit Framework) of the NEP** (National Education Policy) 2020 from the academic year 2023-24.
- The current fifth and sixth semester students are pursuing the English Honours course as per the erstwhile **CBCS curriculum**.

ADDRESSING IMPORTANT CROSS-CUTTING ISSUES

- The courses taught provide a comprehensive learning experience to the students, skillfully integrating cross-cutting issues like gender sensitisation through courses on Women's Writing and Women and Empowerment, critical thinking, race, class, sexuality, power, colonialism, identity, and environmental and ethical concerns. Courses taught in the English curriculum often collaborate with other disciplines like History, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology and Sociology to deepen the understanding of cross-cutting issues.
- Given below are some key texts that deal with issues of race, gender, power, ethics, and colonialism:

- Chinua Achebe, *Things Fall Apart* Explores colonialism and its impact on Igbo society.
- Frantz Fanon, *Black Skin, White Masks* (Excerpt: "The Negro and Language") A critical examination of race and identity under colonial rule.
- Ngugi wa Thiong'o, *Decolonising the Mind* (Excerpt: "The Language of African Literature") Discusses the power dynamics of language and colonialism.
- Gabriel Garcia Marquez, *Chronicle of a Death Foretold* Touches upon race and power in Latin America.
- Langston Hughes, *Harlem* (Poem) Addresses racial injustice and the African American experience.

Gender & Power

- Mary Wollstonecraft, A Vindication of the Rights of Woman A foundational feminist text advocating for women's education and rights.
- Mahasweta Devi, *Draupadi* (translated by Gayatri Chakravorty Spivak) A powerful critique of gender-based oppression and state violence.
- Virginia Woolf, A Room of One's Own Examines gender and power structures in literature and society.
- **Simone de Beauvoir,** *The Second Sex* ("Introduction") Foundational feminist theory on the construction of womanhood.
- Adrienne Rich, A Mark of Resistance (Poem) Explores feminist resistance and identity. Ethics & Power
- George Orwell, *Shooting an Elephant* A reflection on colonialism, power, and moral dilemmas.

- **Toni Morrison,** *Beloved* Discusses slavery, trauma, and ethical questions related to historical injustices.
- B.R. Ambedkar, *Annihilation of Caste* (Excerpts: Chapters 4, 6, 14) A powerful critique of caste-based discrimination and social hierarchy in India.

Colonialism & Postcolonialism

- Postcolonial Theories (Peter Barry, *Beginning Theory* on Postcolonial Criticism) Discusses the impact of colonialism on literature and identity.
- Ania Loomba, *Colonialism/Postcolonialism* Explores key concepts of colonialism and postcolonial theory.
- **Rabindranath Tagore,** *The Home and the World* Examines nationalism, colonialism, and gender roles in pre-independence India.





A TRIBUTE ON THE BIRTHDAY OF WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE






FACULTY EXCHANGE PROGRAMS

The resource person of the webinar was Dr. Saikat Banerjee, Assistant Professor of the department of English of St. Xavier's College, Ranchi. Dr. Banerjee spoke eloquently on the short stories of Kartar Singh Duggal, a prolific and highly regarded writer in the Punjabi language, but one who is relatively lesser known outside his home state. 

The English departmental library has a collection of over two hundred books for the reference of the students and teachers of the department.

English Language Laboratory



In keeping with the previous NAAC recommendations, the department has a language laboratory in order to facilitate acquisition and fluency of English language among students from vernacular mediums.

The state-of-the-art laboratory has ten user consoles and one teacher console.

The Teacher console has four tabs: the first tab provides information of students and icons for two-way communication. The teacher console has the following features:

- Control for group discussion

The Student Consoles enable downloading of the recorded lesson from the teacher's console. The students can listen to the native speaker's lessons and pronunciations, see video clippings and read the text. The students have provision to type the text material on the screen.

The students can repeat the lesson assigned by the linguist, record, and replay. Continuous repetition of the correct pronunciation gives fluency. This paves the way to excellent communication.
